New strategic plan effort kicks off

istrict 68 has begun to develop a new five-year strategic plan, and all stakeholders are encouraged to participate.

The school board is seeking ideas from parents, staff, community members and, for the first time, junior-high students. "Our purpose is to gather input from a representative group of people about what they think our goals and direction should be for the next five years," said Supt. James Garwood.

Board President Una McGeough, who worked on the last strategic plan five years ago, said, "As a public school district, part of our role is to ensure that we reflect community priorities, while also meeting state and federal statutory requirements and adhering to excellent educational practices."

The board has emphasized community involvement in its discussions with the superintendent. The board also identified areas for consideration, such as early childhood education efforts, student achievement across different groups, and equity.

The district has been recruiting people to serve on a planning com-

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mittee. Emails went out in September to parents and other community members asking them to apply.

Every school in District 68 will be represented on the committee, as will student subgroups such as English learners and special education students. Teachers, classified staff members, administrators and board members will be included along with parents, business owners and members of the community at large. Representatives from the Village of Skokie, the Skokie Public Library and the Niles Township District for Special Education (NTDSE) also will be involved. About 50 people will serve and take part in a full-day focus group session on Oct. 28.

"They will give us areas to explore, which we will then research and discuss at the administrative level and board level before any decision-making takes place," Dr. Garwood said. "They have a vested interest in an excellent school system, so it's up to us to listen to the people we serve."

At the Oct. 28 meeting, committee members will discuss their ideas and review results of an online survey that opened on Oct. 2 at the district website (www.skokie68.org/about/survey).

All residents of the district are encouraged to take the survey. Respondents can choose from six languages: English, Spanish, Urdu, Syrian, Tagalog and Arabic. For convenience, parents can take the survey at special kiosks set up in their children's schools during

parent-teacher conferences in October.

District 68 has hired Jeffery Cohn of Brave Dialogue to serve as a facilitator during the strategic planning process. An organizational consultant, he has helped Niles District 71 and NTDSE with their recent strategic plans.

"I was part of that NTDSE process last spring and I was happy with his approach. I looked at eight or nine possibilities and I like his style best of all for our district," Supt. Garwood said.

After the Oct. 28 meeting, Mr. Cohn will meet with Dr. Garwood and other administrators to draft the strategic plan, which will then be shared with the steering committee. The final plan will be submitted to the school board for a vote in December or January.
